John Ramsland: *Venturing into No Man's Land*

This is the compelling story of Lieutenant Joseph 'Darkie' Maxwell DCM, MC and Bar, VC—the second highest decorated Australian soldier of the First World War. Meticulously researched by historian John Ramsland, Maxwell's colourful life is traced from his childhood on the Hunter coalfields until his death at age 71 in a soldier's settlement home in Matraville Sydney. Maxwell was a vivid storyteller who wrote *Hells Bells and Mademoiselles*, telling of his experiences in the war. In telling Maxwell's story, Ramsland has uncovered many forgotten documents to piece together an extraordinary life of an extraordinary man. RRP \$26.99 ISBN 978-1-92203-663-6, pb, 2013.

Diana Wyndham: *Norman Haire and the Study of Sex* [Foreword by The Hon Michael Kirby AC, CMG]

In an era when talking about sex was taboo, Australian-born sexologist Dr Norman Haire broke all the rules. In the 1920s and 30s he had a network of influential friends and achieved fame as a Harley Street gynaecologist for

the rich which funded his free birth control clinics for the poor. His zeal for sex education, women's rights and birth control contributed to the widespread social changes which were to follow but also earned him powerful enemies. Now the work of this tenacious, humane, witty, brave and innovative man is largely forgotten. Phillip Adams, in his *Late Night Live*, ABC Radio National discussion with Diana Wyndham, said her fascinating book would do much to put 'Saint Norman' back on the pedestal where he belongs.

Susan Steggall: *A Most Generous Scholar: Joan Kerr, Art and Architectural Historian*

Joan Kerr (1938-2004) was the author of ground-breaking art histories that included the work of women, Aboriginal artists and minor genres, consistent with her democratic approach to Australia's visual culture. A rigorous academic, she was also a larrikin intellectual who relished a good argument. There were many of them and the telling of her life makes grand reading. Original, entertaining and often controversial, Joan Kerr was a one of a kind scholar. Susan Steggall's biography of Kerr is essential reading for all those interested in the women's lives, cultural studies and the intimate histories of art and architecture.

Readers will recall that in Bulletin 60 February 2012, there was news that Elizabeth Fletcher had edited the doctoral thesis that her late husband had written, but whose death prevented its presentation. The book has been published (details above) and now reviewed with high praise by Paula Findlen, Ubaldo Pierotti Professor of Italian History at Stanford University in Chicago; she is also Co-Director of the Center for Medieval and Early Modern Studies.

The thesis was 900 pages long and written forty-five years ago, and the editor had the added task of coping with the author's acknowledged almost indecipherable handwriting. But in spite of all difficulties the reviewer has declared that the text has stood the test of time, and has provided "an intellectual treasure trove" for students of the enigmatic and fascinating scholar who is the subject of the work.
